A LETTER FROM THE CHIEF

Dear Gulf Shores Community Member:

As your Chief of Police I am proud to present the Gulf Shores Police Department 2018 Annual Report.

In 2018 our greatest challenge was finding highly-qualified candidates to fill vacant patrol officer positions. We are not alone. Police Departments throughout the United States are struggling to recruit, hire, and retain, police officers while at the same time committing to not “lower the bar” regarding standards.



There are many reasons for the shortage of police officer candidates throughout the nation but most significant are the unjust and inaccurate vilification of officers by some special interest groups and also by some in the media.

Agencies are in significant competition for those few that choose our profession and are well qualified.

In late 2018 the Mayor, City Council, and City Administrator took steps to help with this issue by creating a new pay and hiring bonus system for police officers that makes us extremely competitive with other Alabama and Gulf Coast agencies.

I am confident that we will continue to hire the best and brightest people. Those that are chosen to be Gulf Shores Police Officers will be working with professional men and women committed to providing excellence in policing and setting new standards in best police practices.

It is also worth noting that in 2017 Part I (the most serious) crimes dropped by more than 10% in 2018 as compared to 2017 while less serious incidents stayed more or less the same. This is a testament to the hard work of the men and women of GSPD.

Our dedicated personnel have met past challenges, and they've been very successful. We are committed to continuing that proud tradition. We strive to improve the quality of life in our neighborhoods and on our beautiful beach by combating crime, while at the same time implementing crime prevention and community policing strategies.

I thank you for your support of the people of GSPD who help provide a safe environment for the citizens and tourists living in or visiting our wonderful community.







PATROL DIVISION

The Gulf Shores Police Department Patrol Division is currently allotted positions for twenty four sworn patrol officers. Within this division are four Patrol Command Sergeants, six Sergeants, four canine units, and four Field Training Officers. As the largest division of the Gulf Shores Police Department the Patrol Division averages approximately 170 criminal arrests and an average 1500 calls for service per month. The officers of this division conduct standard police functions: making arrests, conducting investigations, issuing citations, handling calls for service, and supporting the efforts of the investigative division.

The Patrol Division also has personnel assigned to Field Training, Special Operations, K-9, School Enforcement, Training Duties, and Beach Patrol. The division is administrated by a Patrol Lieutenant. Other major functions of the Patrol Division traditionally include traffic safety programs, accident investigations, fatal traffic accident and traffic crime investigations, addressing traffic complaints, multi-agency coordination, community partnerships, general traffic, and DUI enforcement. The Patrol Division is also used for special events, crowd control, and parking problems. In 2018 police operations at the schools, and the department's Special Response Team were transferred to the Patrol Division.

Members of the division are dedicated to building partnerships, relationships, and trust between law enforcement and the community. The Patrol Division is proud to provide year-round, twenty-four hour, service to the citizens and guest of the City of Gulf Shores.



The ACE Award is presented to officers with ten or more self-initiated felony arrests within a twelve month period. OFFICER OF THE YEAR



Officer Ben Hancock was named the 2018 Officer of the Year. Officer Hancock is 27 years old and has been with the Gulf Shores Police Department since May of 2014. He is a graduate of Decatur High School and has completed significant course work towards his Bachelor's Degree at the University of South Alabama.

Officer Hancock's activity for the year included responding to 973 calls for service. He made 93 arrests 24 of those being for narcotics. He also issued 119 traffic citations as well as 96 warnings.

Officer Hancock received the award for Officer of the Month in March, November, and December of 2018.

On November 27, 2018 Officer Hancock followed up on a lead at a reported burglary call at Summer Trace Apartments. During the course of that investigation Officer Hancock recovered a large amount of methamphetamine that led to an arrest on drug trafficking charges.

On December 15, 2018 Officer Hancock stopped a vehicle for a traffic violation in the 200 Block of West Beach Boulevard. Going beyond the violation at hand Hancock ended up recovering six stolen televisions and drawing felony warrants on three subjects for burglary of a residence on West Beach Boulevard and for possession of stolen property.

These are only two examples among many that illustrate how Officer Hancock goes above and beyond to provide a high level of service to the Gulf Shores Community. Officer Hancock's supervisors frequently point out his positive attitude and willingness to take on new challenges in their reviews of Officer Hancock's performance.

His dedication to crime prevention, his tireless work ethic, attention to detail and professionalism all make Officer Ben Hancock the clear choice for 2018 Patrol Officer of the Year.

K-9 UNIT

During 2018, the Gulf Shores K9 Unit utilized five K9 Teams. Four of the K9 Teams were assigned to the Patrol Division. They are trained in apprehension, narcotic detection, obedience and tracking. One of the K9 Teams is currently assigned to the Baldwin County Special Operations Unit to assist in drug interdiction.


The Teams are utilized by GSPD officers and other law enforcement agencies to help locate illegal narcotics and dangerous fugitives who have committed crimes. With the assistance of their K9 partners; they were able to locate and recover over \$360,000 in cash (drug related) and several pounds of dangerous narcotics.

The K9 Unit continues to be popular with the general public with more than a dozen requests for public demonstrations.

In March, the K9 Unit attended the United States Police Canine Association (USPCA) Regional Field Trials in Pensacola, Florida. In September, they qualified to attend the USPCA National Field Trials that were held in Huntsville, Alabama. This event hosted more than 120 other K9 Teams throughout the United States. Their dedication and hard work earned them 4th Place as the Top Regional Team.




INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION



The Gulf Shores Police Department Criminal Investigations Division consists of detectives who follow up on misdemeanors and felony crimes. Some Members are also assigned to task forces including the Baldwin County Drug Task Force, and The Baldwin County Special Operations Unit.

Another function of the division is responsibility for the evidence and property rooms. This includes the safeguarding and tracking of drugs, money, guns, and other items used in crimes. These items must be maintained in a fashion so they can be used to convict the guilty as well as protect the innocent and gain justice for the victims. In 2018 the evidence room received 1051 new items consisting of both found property and criminal evidence. At any given time there are over 4,000 items in custody of the evidence room. Each year an inventory (audit) is conducted to account for all the items.

The Gulf Shores Criminal Investigation's Division also carries many secondary responsibilities involving these local and state task force assignments: SART – Sexual Assault Response Team (Adult Victims) MDT- Mult-Disciplinary Team (Child Abuse, physical and sexual) Baldwin County Major Crimes Unit, Baldwin County Drug Task Force, Baldwin County Special Operations Unit.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS


During the 2018-2019 school years, the Gulf Shores Police Department increased its commitment to protecting our youth by adding two more certified School Resource Officers (SRO) bringing the total to four. Sgt. Marlin Hanner, Sgt. Lorant Baranovics, Sgt. Josh Coleman, and Officer Mike Drummond are all assigned to our school system and there are never any less than three of these officers on the campuses. They are all certified through the National Association of School Resource Officers.

Sgt. Marlin Hanner and Sgt Lorant Baranovics are the supervisors in charge of coordinating our SRO program and integrating the school system and the police department so they are a cohesive unit in attaining our goal of providing the best protection to our youth and also building positive relationships with them. Sgt. Coleman serves as a teacher at Gulf Shores High School and teaches law enforcement classes.

The duties of the SRO program include: active foot patrols of the three school campuses, building relationships with students and school staff, providing escorts and security for extra-curricular events, and handle any juvenile issues that arise.

The Gulf Shores Police Department will continue to place an emphasis on our SRO program and strive to ensure that our youth are given the safest environment possible and have every chance to succeed as we move into our first year as a city school system beginning in the fall of 2019.





HONOR GUARD

The Gulf Shores Honor Guard is dedicated to upholding the highest values and traditions of men and women of law enforcement. The Honor Guard proudly presents the National Colors, State Colors, and Organizational Colors at various events. The presentation of colors is customary at the opening of patriotic and sporting events and is often accompanied by the playing of our national anthem.

The Gulf Shores Police Honor Guard's priority is to honor fallen officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice during the performance of his/her duties. The Gulf Shores Honor Guard also represents the department at employee funerals for both current and retired members who have passed away.

In 2018 the Gulf Shores Honor Guard presented the colors for local as well as national sporting events in our area. The Gulf Shores Honor Guard also presented colors for Police related conferences in our area during 2018.

SOUTH BALDWIN SPECIAL RESPONSE TEAM

The Gulf Shores Police Department is one of three member agencies that make up South Baldwin Special Response Team (SBSRT), a regional tactical team. SBSRT is composed of officers from the cities of Foley, Gulf Shores, and Orange Beach.

SBSRT has an outstanding reputation within our region. Team members have served at a variety of high-profile positions in the law enforcement industry including executive level leadership on the Alabama Tactical Officers Association.

This regional team was formed to provide resolution to high-risk situations. These highly trained and well equipped officers allows:

- Safe and effective response to potentially volatile situations throughout the region
- Access to one of the largest tactical teams in the State of Alabama
- Benefit of paying for 1/3 of the cost of a tactical team.

SBSRT duties include:

- High-risk warrant service
- Dignitary protection
- Armed barricade suspect resolution
- Hostage rescue



SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

The special operations division is responsible for training, corrections, community service officers, marine division, special events and the dive team. The special operations division currently is made up of thirteen full time officers overseeing all these functions.

Where special events are concerned Gulf Shores has become a place where many various events are held. A great deal of sports now hold their events here, some of which are broadcast nationally on various forums and sports channels. Volleyball, half and full marathons, softball and baseball championships as well as many more are now held here regularly. Also held here are non-sporting events such as the National Shrimp Fest and Mardi Gras parades. One of the largest of these is the Hangout Music Fest. The Hangout Music Fest draws 35,000 to 40,000 persons a day over a three day period. This as well as the others offer the area great events and entertainment while presenting challenges to the police department.


The special operations division works to staff these events keeping them and the public safe. Some require only a few officers or traffic control to run smoothly and some a great deal more. The Hangout Music Fest involves assistance of many law enforcement and public safety from the region. Assisting are federal agencies, state departments, county sheriff and many local municipal departments.



MARINE UNIT

The Underwater Search and Recovery Team (USRT) had a handful of search and recovery missions during 2018. The Marine Unit had limited activity in the Gulf waters and lagoon area. Everyone obeyed boating laws and stayed safe while operating in the waters.

Over the winter months, dive training is planned but in the confines of the local indoor pool. The team had a lot of turnover this past year. Current members of the USRT are SGT Paul Maliska, CPL Joshua Hoguet, CPL Nathaniel Harris, CPL Lorant Baranovics, CPL Brandon Ward, Officers Shawn Andrews, Seth Headley, Jeffrey Bunn, and Chief Ed Delmore. Our volunteers are Jim Mahan, Ret. CPL Billy Berrey, and city employee Matt Young. SGT Maliska continues to lead the team and is in charge of all aspects related to the Marine Police Unit and the Underwater Search and Recovery Team.



The Underwater Search and Recovery Team (USRT) missions for the year included recovering an unoccupied submerged vehicle in the area of Splash Island, a pickup and boat trailer from Canal Park, and recovering a reported stolen motorcycle from Canal Park as well. The Team also assisted in the search and recovery of possible evidence on the North side of Canal Park related to an incident that occurred in Foley. We were unable to locate any evidence for the case.

Storm bands from Hurricane Michael on October 7th caused a motorist to lose control of his vehicle and drive it off of the roadway and into the Intracoastal Waterway on East Canal. The driver was able to swim safely to shore. The vehicle location was not known until late December. A recovery dive mission for the vehicle is forthcoming for 2019.

SHOP WITH A COP



This year marks the second time the Gulf Shores Police Association hosted the “Shop with a Cop” event. Twelve children were selected in partnership with the Gulf Shores School District to participate. Those twelve children were picked up at their residence by a patrol car and received a front seat ride to breakfast. While at breakfast, officers were able to develop a relationship with the children before shopping. Officers then took the children shopping for Christmas presents for each family member. Afterwards the presents were wrapped by the children then placed under their Christmas trees at their residence.

After dropping the children off at their homes, officers then went shopping for all the children to surprise them with gifts on Christmas morning. On Christmas morning, officers delivered the gifts along with food to the children’s residence.

All gifts and food were donated by outside donations and the Gulf Shores Police Association.

PUBLIC SAFETY ACADEMY

The goal of the Gulf Shores High School Public Safety Academy is to provide introductory opportunities in the area of public safety to students interested in professional public service occupations such as Police Officers, Fire Fighter, and Law Professionals. Together in a partnership with community public service agencies, Gulf Shores Police offers a comprehensive program of specialized training so that, upon graduation, students will be prepared or skilled entry-level jobs and/or entrance into colleges, universities, academies, or technical schools.

POLICE EXPLORER PROGRAM

Exploring is a youth-oriented program for young adults ages 14 thru 18. The primary purpose of Exploring is to provide through actual training and experience a means by which young men and women may determine if they would like to pursue a career in law enforcement as adults.

The Gulf Shores Police Explorer Post 49 is governed by Learning for life, a division of the Boy Scouts. Being an Explorer allows members to build character, learn leadership skills and how to work together as a team. To achieve these goals the Post participates in a variety of activities that involve community service and personal development.

GULF SHORES PEDESTRIAN & BICYCLE COMMITTEE

The City of Gulf Shores developed a committee which spotlighted its interest on the bicycle community. The Gulf Shores Pedestrian and Bicycle Committee consist of many various civilians within the Gulf Shores Community. One officer from the Gulf Shores Police Department is a part of the committee board which assists, gives safety briefings and helps oversee community bicycle events. Currently there are four rides one of which is partnered with the Girl Scouts troop 8290. This is the “Bike to School” ride which allows children attending the Gulf Shores school district to ride with officers before and after school.

COFFEE WITH A COP

Gulf Shores Police Department takes time to meet residents and visitors at neutral locations within the community. Sitting down with individuals and breaking down barriers allows citizens and officers to develop mutual goals in helping better serve the community. This event has been a popular event and has created a following for those in the Gulf Shores area.



NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

The City of Gulf Shores has embraced the National Night Out like no other community has. The event has grown larger and larger each year bringing our community together to see and share the many great programs the Gulf Shores Police Department and Fire Department are involved in. In building this great event, it has expanded to include all of the City’s first responders as well as including other departments such as the Library, Public Works, and Recreation. The Gulf Shores National Night Out is truly a community event. This year, Mother Nature decided to cause logistic as well as safety issues that resulted in us canceling this awesome event. The Gulf Shores Police Department will be hosting this event in 2019.

V.I.P.'S


Volunteers at the Gulf Shores Police Department are formally known as VIPS or Volunteers in Police service. This program was instituted in 2012 and continues to grow and enrich our department and its personnel. Our volunteers come from all walks of life and bring a wealth of experience to our department. They assist with nearly every function and event that the department is involved with. One of our VIPS is a Dive Instructor and brings years of experience and expertise to our Police Dive Team and has certified all of its members. The volunteers are able to assist the high school career development course which the police department All members of the VIPS receive the necessary training to safely perform their duties.

DETENTION FACILITY

The Gulf Shores Detention Center is a twenty-six bed facility. The facility has two cell blocks with six cells in each block along with two temporary holding cells. The facility is staffed with 8 full time Detention Officers and a Detention Supervisor.

Detention Officers booked 2,115 individuals into the Detention Center in 2018, and the Facility housed a daily average of 16 inmates (12 males, 4 females).

Daily duties of a Detention Officer include; serving three meals, monitoring inmates, supplying inmates with necessities, supplying clean uniforms and bedding, making sure the facility stays clean and sanitary, ordering supplies, logging all inspections and inmate counts, bringing everyone arrested to their bond hearing before a Magistrate, booking and releasing inmates, daily activity reports, court security, work special events, traffic details, and transport inmates from other facilities and to medical appointments.






