

# A LETTER FROM THE CHIEF

The 2019 Annual Report provides an overview of the accomplishments and challenges of the Gulf Shores Police Department (GSPD) in the past year. It also highlights the service of our members that have distinguished themselves in the last year.

GSPD continues to be a regional law-enforcement leader due to the excellence of our employees, our innovative use of technology and tactics, and dedication to improving the quality of life for the citizens and visitors of Gulf Shores.

An unfortunate trend throughout the United States finds agencies with severe staffing issues within the sworn police officer ranks. Recognizing and intending to combat that potential issue here our City Administrator, Mayor, and City Council took steps to make GSPD pay and benefits extremely competitive. As a result GSPD is at its full authorized strength – giving us the ability to effectively protect and serve.

The most significant single incident in Gulf Shores in 2019 occurred in the early morning on September 9th. The incident was, thankfully, a rarity in Gulf Shores. An individual attacked and attempted to murder several GSPD Officers. Fortunately the Officers were able to respond both heroically and appropriately. None of the Officers suffered serious injuries and the suspect took his own life within minutes of his initial attack.

The incident is a reminder that bad things can happen in good places and that as a law enforcement agency we must always be prepared. Again, I must thank our elected officials for their support and appreciate their continuing efforts to provide us the resources allowing our personnel to be well trained and prepared.

In coming years GSPD will continue our efforts to protect persons and property by providing essential law enforcement services, while promoting community involvement, stability and order through service, assistance, and visibility.





# PATROL DIVISION

The Gulf Shores Police Department Patrol Division consists of four Patrol/Responder Squads and one Squad attached to the City School System. Within this division are four Patrol Command Sergeants, six Sergeants, four canine units, and four Field Training Officers. As the largest division of the Gulf Shores Police Department the Patrol Division averages approximately 170 criminal arrests and an average 1500 calls for service per month. The officers of this division conduct standard police functions: making arrests, conducting investigations, issuing citations, handling calls for service, and supporting the efforts of the investigative division.

The Patrol Division also has personnel assigned to Field Training, Special Weapons and Tactics, K-9, School Enforcement, Training Duties, and Beach Patrol. The division is administrated by a Patrol Lieutenant. Other major functions of the Division traditionally include traffic safety programs, accident investigations, fatal traffic accident and traffic crime investigations, addressing traffic complaints, multi-agency coordination, community partnerships, general traffic, and DUI enforcement. The patrol division is also used for special events, crowd control, and parking problems.

Members of the division are dedicated to building partnerships, relationships, and trust between law enforcement and the community. The Patrol Division is proud to provide year-round, twenty-four hour, service to the citizens and guest of the City of Gulf Shores.



# OFFICER OF THE YEAR

Officer Seth Headley was named the 2019 Patrol Officer of the Year. Officer Headley is 31 years old and has been with the Gulf Shores Police Department since April of 2012. Seth is married to Jordin, his wife of seven years and they are the proud parents of son Asher and daughter Everly. Officer Headley has also served in the United States Coast Guard Reserves since 2007. Officer Headley's activity for the year includes responding to 1650 calls for service. He made 107 arrests, 24 of which were for felony charges. He also issued 82 traffic citations as well and 110 warnings.

Officer Headley received the award for Officer of the Month in April, August, and December of 2019. Among several activities in April Officer Headley made a vehicle stop which resulted in felony narcotics charges. Going beyond the initial arrest Headley was able to develop information which became vital to furthering investigations into methamphetamine distributing around the area.

As a K-9 Handler Officer Headley regularly assist other officers and agencies as well as utilizing his K-9 to further his own investigations. An example of the latter occurred in August when Headley, after deploying his K-9 on a traffic stop, ultimately recovered both cocaine and methamphetamine. In this instance firearms were also recovered from a person involved in criminal activity.

On December 21, 2019 Officer Headley's persistence and professionalism once again helped to resolve a bad situation. On that date Headley developed information that a subject of active warrants was at a local hotel. When initial attempts to make contact failed to produce results Headley did not give up. Rather he coordinated with others on his Squad and ultimately was able to contact the subject and make an arrest. In this case narcotics were again located; unfortunately along with the suspect's young children. Due to Officer Headley's efforts the children were temporarily removed from a dangerous situation and DHR is now actively involved in overseeing their wellbeing and providing available resources to improve the situation.

Beyond his excellent work as a K-9 Handler Officer Headley is also frequently recognized by his supervisors for his dedicated work on the South Baldwin SWAT Team, the G.S.P.D. Dive Team, and his frequent efforts to support community service initiatives. Officer Headley's continuing efforts to set and meet a high professional standard have made him the clear choice for 2019 Patrol Officer of the Year



# K-9 UNIT

In 2019, the Gulf Shores Police Department celebrated 20 years with having a continuous active K9 Unit.

In July 1999, K9 Vim was selected as the first K9 to the Unit. He was partnered with Officer John Hamrick. K9 Vim and Officer Hamrick proved to be a valuable asset to the community and the department. Within two years, a second K9 team was selected and implemented into the program.

Since 1999, sixteen police canines have served the community. During this 20 years; dozens of wanted fugitives have been tracked/apprehended and over a million dollars in illegal assets and narcotics have been seized with the assistance of our K9 partners. Numerous K9 demonstrations have been performed in front of thousands of citizens. The K9 Unit continues to be the most popular and requested unit for public demonstrations.

# SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS


During the 2019-2020 school years, the Gulf Shores Police Department increased its commitment to protecting our youth by increasing the number of certified School Resource Officers (SRO's) to five. Sgt. Marlin Hanner, Sgt. Lorant Baranovics, Officer Schutz, Officer Jim Lord, and Officer Mike Drummond are all assigned to our school system and there are never any less than three of these officers on the campuses. Officer Schutz has been assigned to the Gulf Shores Elementary School, Officer Jim Lord is assigned to the Gulf Shores Middle School, and Officer Drummond is assigned to the Gulf Shores High School. They are all certified through the National Association of School Resource Officers.

Sgt. Marlin Hanner and Sgt. Lorant Baranovics are the supervisors in charge of coordinating our SRO program and integrating the school system and the police department so they are a cohesive unit in attaining our goals of providing the best protection to our youth and also building positive relationships with them.

The duties of the SRO program include: constant presence on every school campus for any issues that arise, building relationships with students and school staff, providing escorts and security for various sporting events, dances, and school functions, and handling any juvenile criminal issues that arise.

The Gulf Shores Police Department has worked closely with the Gulf Shores City School System in their first year in promoting a safe, education driven environment for all students and staff. The Gulf Shores Police Department will continue to explore ways to increase safety and keep our school system as a beacon of excellence.





# MARINE UNIT

The Underwater Search and Recovery Team (USRT) conducted only three search and recovery missions in 2019. Once again, the Marine Unit had limited activity in the Gulf waters and Lagoon area. Boaters are obeying boating laws and stayed safe while operating in the local waters.

Dive training is conducted when weather and water conditions permit throughout the year. Over the winter months, it is conducted in the confines of the indoor pool at the Bodenhamer Recreation Center. The team did obtain Wreck Diver certification this year. This training gives us the necessary knowledge and confidence to enter the interior of vehicles of various sizes to recover evidence and if necessary, trapped individuals. Current members of the USRT are Command Sergeant Paul Maliska – Dive Master, Sergeants Joshua Hoguet – Dive Master in training, Lorant Baranovics – Dive Master in training, Nathaniel Harris, Brandon Ward, Officers Shawn Andrews and Seth Headley. Our volunteers on the team are Jim Mahan, Retired Sergeant Billy Berrey, and city employees Matt Young and Melvin Sheppard. CSGT Maliska continues to lead the team and is in charge of all aspects related to the Marine Police Unit and the Underwater Search and Recovery Team.

Dive Recovery missions for the year included the recovery of the vehicle which was driven into the Intracoastal Waterway on October 7, 2018 during Hurricane Michael. Another vehicle recovery was conducted in the Canal early in 2019 when a subject drove into the Canal. The vehicle and occupant were recovered with the assistance of the Orange Beach Fire Department. The USRT also assisted our Investigations Division with the recovery of a body which was discovered in the marshy area of Lake Shelby in the Alabama State Park.



# SOUTH BALDWIN COUNTY SWAT

The City of Gulf Shores has 10 police officers and 7 paramedics assigned to the South Baldwin Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) team. GSPD and GSFD work alongside Foley Police Department, Foley Fire Department, Orange Beach Police Department, and Orange Beach Fire Department as a large multi-agency team providing tactical support to the cities of Gulf Shores, Orange Beach, and Foley.



# CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION



The Gulf Shores Police Department Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is commanded by Lt. Michael Hill. The CID includes a command sergeant, a sergeant, four detectives and two narcotic detectives. This division is responsible for the follow up on various significant misdemeanors and felony crimes. Additionally the division handles evidence collection, crime scene processing, juveniles, background investigations for future employees, and sex offender registration. Some members are also assigned to esteemed programs such as the Baldwin County Drug Task Force, and the Baldwin County Special Operations Unit. The primary mission of this division is to conduct investigations on serious crimes that occur within the City of Gulf Shores, identify the criminals involved and bring them to justice.

Another function of the CID is responsibility for the evidence and property rooms. The Gulf Shores Police Department property & evidence custodian entered 1,637 items this past year into the evidence management database this past year. The focus is to ensure that any property acquired, maintained and retained by the department through investigative means is accurately documented and secured until adjudication. Property can include bicycles, weapons, cash, jewelry, drugs, vehicles and anything else with evidentiary value to criminal cases. Annual inventories and periodic inspections are conducted to ensure that property has been properly submitted, packaged, accounted-for, released or destroyed according to policy. More than 4,000 pieces of evidence and property are under the custodianship of the evidence custodian at any given time.

The Gulf Shores Criminal Investigation's Division also carries many secondary responsibilities involving these local and state task force assignments: SART – Sexual Assault Response Team (Adult Victims), MDT- Multi-Disciplinary Team (Child Abuse, physical and sexual), Baldwin County Major Crimes Unit, Baldwin County Drug Task Force, and Baldwin County Special Operations Unit. The relentless dedication of this division to the community which it serves contributes to the safe and secure small town big beach atmosphere.

## **PROPERTY & EVIDENCE and CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION**

The Gulf Shores Police Department property & evidence custodian entered 1,637 items this past year into the evidence management database this past year. Command Sergeant King is our evidence and property custodian and is certified property and evidence specialist through the International Association for Property and Evidence. The evidence custodian participated in training courses throughout the year to include the Alabama Department of Forensic Science: Essentials of Forensic Sciences. The topics covered by this course include evidence selection and submission, case types, emerging trends, forensic discipline-specific legal statutes, and forensic expert testimony. The custodian continues to purge evidence that is no longer in need of retaining.


The custodian focus is to ensure that any property acquired, maintained and retained by the department through investigative means is accurately documented and secured until adjudication. Property can include bicycles, weapons, cash, jewelry, drugs, vehicles and anything else with evidentiary value to criminal cases. The evidence custodian consists of one Command Sergeant. Annual inventories and periodic inspections are conducted to ensure that property has been properly submitted, packaged, accounted-for, released or destroyed according to policy. More than 4,000 pieces or more of evidence and property are under the custodianship of the evidence custodian at any given time.

## **CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION**

The crime scene investigation is staffed by one technician and members of Criminal Investigation Division. The focus is to ensure that crime scenes, from buildings and vehicles to fields and roadways, are secured and professionally processed for evidentiary value. The crime scene investigators are specially trained evidence collecting, documentation and packaging specifically in latent fingerprinting, DNA collection and digital photography at crime scenes. Through their diligent efforts, many cases are met with successful conclusions.

# SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

The special operations division consists of corrections, training, community service and special events. These concerns vary from the daily care of inmates who are sentenced to jail to ensuring officers attend mandatory training hours as well as directing traffic for school zones.

MOBILE COMMAND

In ensuring officers receive training the division must make sure 12 hours minimum are attained for all sworn officers but also that training is relevant and valuable to the mission of the department. Training is held locally as well as attended nationally. Training will cover subjects from supervision and law updates to active shooter and officer survival.

The division community service officers will direct traffic at schools and to crosswalks assisting with students getting to school safely as well as keeping traffic moving. They are also responsible for operation of city parking machines and animal control.



One of the bigger duties of the special operations division is event planning. Gulf Shores has many events. Some like the National Shrimp Fest have a forty plus year history and while others are much newer, all have difficult demands on law enforcement. The biggest event of the year is the Hangout Music Fest in May. This annual event hosts 40,000 plus persons each day for a 3 day event. Closing down a sizable section of the beachfront of Gulf Shores it brings rigorous demands for the city. The Gulf Shores police are supported in this event by other local, county, state and federal agencies to make sure the event is safe for all.

The public information officers also work out of the Special Operations division. They work to make sure clear, relevant and timely information flows from the department to the public. This is accomplished thru normal media outlets and well as many social media sites.

In the varied sections of the Special Operations division there are 14 sworn and civilian officers working to further the goals of the department.


# DETENTION FACILITY

The Gulf Shores Detention Facility is a twenty-six bed facility. There are two cell blocks, six cells with two beds each in each block along, with two temporary holding cells. The facility is staffed with 8 full time Detention Officers and a Detention Supervisor. The facility is under the overall command of the Special Operations Division Lieutenant.

Detention Officers booked 1,783 individuals into the Detention Center in 2019, the Facility housed a daily average of 15 inmates (12 males, 3 females), and served approximately 13,425 meals.

Daily duties of a Detention Officer include; serving three meals, monitoring inmates, supplying in-mates with necessities, supplying clean uniforms and bedding, making sure the facility stays clean and sanitary, ordering supplies, logging all inspections and inmate counts, bringing every-one arrested to their bond hearing before a Magistrate, booking and releasing inmates, daily ac-tivity reports, court security, work special events, traffic details, and transport inmates from other facilities and to medical appointments.

Average Daily Detention Population


